Association Agreement EU-Georgia

Cooperation involves the following objectives:

- Cooperation in the disaster risk reduction format;
- Information (geospatial), education and communications;
- Best practices aimed at reducing natural disaster prevention or disaster impacts;
- Cooperation to improve the information base on catastrophe, threats and risks assessment management;
- cooperation on environmental and public health in the direction of disaster assessment
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SDI for effective land administration









Land conflicts - Mediation

The new mechanisms are introduced in registration process, such as:

- mediation/notary mediation
- service of "Statement of Facts"
- new standard of cadastral survey/measurement

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• certification of surveyors

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- legalization of deficient documents,
- confirmation of location of land parcel by a representative of municipality
- fast and free-of-charge consideration of a case on illegally occupied land parcel

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• possibility to register 15% more of the agricultural land parcel area indicated in a document.

- WMS/WFS services for data view/download;
- Pollution monitoring map

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Key problem areas for demonstrating the benefits of data sharing were identified:

- Demonstrate the benefits of data sharing and NSDI
- Setting up the initial components of NSDI, assuring the project results to be sustainable, including
 - Organizational framework including roles and responsibilities for the full implementation and operation of NSDI

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- Legal framework
- Technical framework

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- $\circ~$ Data sharing principles and data security management
- $\circ~$ Initial business model and commercial vision

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• Identify current limitations in data (availability of data, data quality, usability of information etc.)





Establishment of the unified National Spatial Data infrastructure (NSDI) in Georgia, which will operate on governmental, sectoral and municipal levels, will ensure:

- Optimal planning for efficient use of the resources in the country and effective management of the processes;
- Support the development of e-governance and the state authorities in spatial data creation and management;
- Reduce costs for data collection and maintenance by avoiding duplication of work and establish efficient co-operation betwee data producers at local, regional and central level;
- Systematization and standardization of the national basic spatial data and metadata and making them as close as possible to the European requirements;

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• Integration of NSDI in regional and European infrastructures

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
